The workplace demand for skilled analysts is expected to continue to be very strong with demand exceeding labor supply for at least the next decade. The primary goal of this course is to improve skills in understanding economic models and to apply an analytical interpretation that allows the student to understand multiple outcomes. Students will be expected to be proficient in both understanding economic concepts and applications. Computer Applications uses the Mathematica programming package as a complement to the economic concepts presented in class. Economic concepts will emphasize applied topics rather than a purely theoretical presentation. Students will learn the basics of applied economic modeling.

Students will be expected to complete weekly assignments that model economic applications using Mathematica.

Two exams will be given that cover the economic theory and materials presented in class. The exams will not include any Mathematica programming.

Students will complete a final project that covers an economic theory not covered in class that includes an applied model that can be demonstrated using Mathematica. Students will choose the theory they cover and each theory must not have been chosen by another student to avoid duplication.
